

Parent and Carer guide to PSHE tasks for this week

This week the focus is on '**Stranger Danger**' and identifying **strangers** and **safer strangers**. As the lockdown begins to ease and you will be going out into the community more, especially with the summer holidays fast approaching, it is important to learn the importance of staying safe, who is safe to talk to and who isn't.

There is a PowerPoint presentation and social story to share with your children and two video clips. The children have three different activities to complete below.

Activity 1 (Monday) - Go through the Stranger Danger PowerPoint and encourage your child to join in with their ideas and discuss.

Watch the video clip of a song about stranger danger, here is the link:

<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=92HCKfYakLU>. - Talk to you children about stranger danger. Discuss and ask questions e.g. who is a stranger? Why shouldn't you talk to strangers? Would you talk to a stranger if they were nice or gave you sweets? Reiterate the importance of staying away from strangers / people they don't know etc.

Now it's time to complete the activity. The task is to identify 'safer strangers' and 'strangers'. Encourage your children to sort the pictures and stick them in the correct section independently. There are two versions for you to choose - one with pictures and the other with words.

Activity 2 (Wednesday) - Watch the stranger danger video with your child, the link is <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=SY7RhBszp0k>. Discuss with them who is safe to talk to and who is not safe to talk to and why. Encourage your children to come up with their own answers and reasons why.

Talk to your children about what to do if they were ever lost or felt unsafe. What should they do? Where is safe to go? Who is safe to ask for help? Etc. Then complete the worksheet.

Activity 3 (Friday) - Replay the videos to reinforce stranger danger awareness. The children must now complete the stranger danger quiz. The quiz has 10 multiple choice questions and the children just have to select the correct statement. I have made two versions, one has 4 multiple choice options and the other has 2 multiple choice options. Therefore, choose the quiz appropriate for your child.

Pupils can design a poster to show the dangers of stranger danger and help to inform others what you should do if a stranger approaches and tries to talk to you OR they could make a 'high five' hand and write five key points of what to do and don't do around strangers.
