





Fine / Gross motor activity ideas

	<p>Herd the Sheep Gross Motor Dramatic Play</p> 		
<p>Stuck in the mud - Mix cornflour, cocoa powder and water to make a muddy oobleck. If mixed right it's solid when you scoop it up and squeeze it, but turns to liquid and "melts away" when you open your hands!</p>	<p>Herd the sheep - Blow up white balloons as 'sheep', use a fly swat or racquet and move (herd) the sheep from one area of the room or garden to another.</p>	<p>Feed the farm animals - Place farm yard cut out faces over cups / containers. Using tweezers, place green pieces of pipe cleaner in their mouths.</p>	<p>Shear the sheep - Make handprint sheep, Stick curling ribbon to each handprint sheep. Using scissors 'shear the sheep' trimming the ribbon and developing fine motor control..</p>

<p>Using square and circle biscuits / crackers create a tractor shape. Cover with coloured icing, use pretzel pieces to add details.</p>	<p>Animal muffins - Use muffins, spread some cream cheese on the muffin and then add sliced fruit to make them look like farm animals.</p>	<p>Pancake shapes farm animals' faces. Cut out different shapes to create the face and add fruit for details.</p>

Mathematics

	<p>Counting more or less - This activity can be played by one child alone, with others. To play, roll the die once and count out that number of farm animal rainbow counters and place them in one fence square. Then roll the die again, taking turns as necessary and count out that number of farm animals into the other fence square. Next, an adult can ask the child:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Which fence has more animals? ● Which one has fewer animals? ● Do the fences have an even amount of animals? ● How do you know? 		<p>Counting - Cut out orange triangles and write the numerals on each carrot. Cut out green strips for the carrot tops. Stick the correct number of carrot tops to each carrot.</p>

Subtraction ducks - using duck bath toys or cut out duck shapes. Write the subtraction sum separately and then remove the correct number of ducks to work out the answer.



Sort by category - Begin to sort the animals into groups based on type, size or colour.



Measure veggies (or fruit) - with a bean ruler, standard ruler or connecting cubes. Child measures each veggie and records the result on their clipboard for a fun way to explore standard / non-standard measurement.



- 1 bag of large lima beans
- sharpies
- a roll of wide, clear tape

Write the numbers on the beans. Tear off a long piece of tape and place the beans on the tape. Place a strip of tape along the top and join together. Trim off the excess tape.



Cow spots - cut out a large cow body shape and draw / glue a printed cow face. Write different numerals over the cow body. As each number is called out, cover with a black splodge of paint.



Cow shapes - Draw and cut out squares and rectangles to make the cow shape. Talk about the shapes:





- Number of sides
- Straight / curved
- Same or different
- Measure the length

Glue them together to create a cow shape and add further details e.g, black splodges, pink nose etc.



Woolly sheep - Use cotton wool and sheep template. Roll the dice and count out the correct number of cotton wool balls to add to your sheep. Have several turns and then the winner is the one with the most cotton wool balls.

Art & Design activities

	<p>Cut out coloured card / paper. Glue hoop cereal to the yellow card to create corn on the cob.</p>		<p>Using a cork, dip into white paint and print to create a woolly sheep outline and add a cut out or painted face and legs.</p>
	<p>Either draw or cut out paper shapes to make a horse head. Glue cut up wool for its mane.</p>		<p>Handprint chicken. Use brown paint (or mixed together blue, red and yellow paint). Place your hand into the paint and then print onto blank paper. Let it dry and add details such as legs, wing, comb and wattles and it's beak.</p>
	<p>Cut out a wiggly circular shape out of bubble wrap. Paint with white paint. Cut out a black sheep head and legs and glue together once dry. Add drawn or googly eyes.</p>		<p>Use the back of a fork instead of a paint brush and apply the yellow paint to make a chick shape. Paint orange legs. Once dry add a folded orange paper beak and eyes.</p>
	<p>Explore old vegetables by printing them on paper.</p>		<p>Glue lolly sticks together. Colour or paint them. Cut out large and small circles for the wheels and exhaust pipe. Glue altogether.</p>
